Ribeye we ordered with asparagus, cream corn (delicious) and spinach. The food was too tasty at such a great price. My partner and I were shocked that this place was not full of capacity based on food itself. They also have a live band that plays on Wednesdays and Saturdays. I'll definitely be back!! They do not serve pastries for dinner to every customer, they choose who to serve bread. I thought it was very discriminatory and my family, friends and I would never have dinner at the Crossing again. The server didn't introduce the table with the special night, we had to ask, we also rushed to leave the restaurant around 6:30 p.m. on Friday. Open0.07 mi hours Claim this is a job? Ask now to update your business information and menu immediately! I had the opportunity to drive to Norcross and passed through a historic part of this community that had Victorian-era and craft homes nested under an umbrella of trees several hundred years old. We were driving through Station Square which was omitted... on one side by railway lines and on the other by low-profile brick buildings housing boutiques and other single shops. Across these adjacent paths was an outdated station that was restored to its original charm and functionality for its former utilitarian purpose. It has a barn door closed between parts of separating the passenger part of the building from the freight and postal services. It has been converted into a restaurant (3rd iteration according to one of the waiters). We decided to have lunch there from their pub-style menu. Crossing counts as a steakhouse: However, I'm not sure it meets this mark. While we were there for lunch and didn't order a steak, we had chopped steak and something called Railway Chicken. I started my meal with a cup of French onion soup that was surprisingly good, well seasoned, not too salty and covered with a nice thick layer of cheese. The meal fell off there. I ordered a chopped steak that was created using three cuts of beef: 80% chuck steak, Brisket and short ribs. This covered in sautéed mushrooms and onions and sauces without which I could. It comes from the side and I chose what the restaurant called hand-cut fries. They were (actually) potato sticks that could come out of a can like Pringles. Although my chopped steak was ordered medium rare, it was very dry. A friend of mine had railway chicken breasts that were lightly breaded and deep-fried. They should have wiped it because the chicken was very greasy to Penny. It was served on a bed of cheesy mashed potatoes and spinach that he said was good. Then they poured the whole dish over homemade remoulade that was not needed. Keep it simple and you have the upper hand. Drinks (tea and soda) came with automatic filling from the jug with which the waitstaff walks. That was a nice touch. As well as the ambience provided by the two freight trains that were sizzling as we shook the building there. Structural sound was raised in 1909. As I mentioned before, the city is historic and charming. Go, walk around and enjoy yourself. Would I go back to crossing steakhouse? I'm not so sure. If I can't get the glorified burger right, what would you do with a steak? There are other restaurants in the square.
